His faith response is an encouragement to us today as we face many situations that stir our fear.

Joseph, Mary, their family, the community, politicians, shepherds, and wisemen all responded in different ways to the news of God's son being born. Each response is recorded in the Scriptures for us to learn from today. Our 2022 Advent Study is designed to help you explore those Scriptures, being attentive to how others responded to the news of Jesus' birth. Our hope is that you will be able to use this same process as you read about anyone's story shared with us in God's Holy Word.

To get the most from this resource:

- Set aside purposeful time to read the scriptures about the birth of Jesus.
- Examine your hearts, prayerfully asking the Lord to help you respond to His call with deep-rooted faith.
- Praise the Lord for being Immanuel ~ an ever-present and loving God.

Advent 2022 - Week 1

Matthew 1:18-25

Often, we face circumstances that stir fear and require us to step out courageously as we trust the Lord to have the best outcome for us, even when it seems otherwise.

Joseph's response to the Lord's command to take Mary as his wife was driven by his deep faith in God. As we read the scriptures, we witness his courageous faith- faith that helped him move forward in the face of doubt and fear.

A deep faith relationship with the Lord moves us to follow Him boldly, even where fear and doubt exist.

Joseph's faith propelled him to lay aside his first impulses as he surrendered to God's plan in obedience. When the world would direct him to call off his engagement with Mary and publicly shame her, he chose to respond in faith and obey the Lord's call to take a pregnant Mary as his wife. His faith response is an encouragement to us today as we experience many situations that trigger our fear.

As you read today's passage (Matthew 1:18-25), invite the Lord to speak to you personally through Joseph's story of faith, obedience, and trust.

THIS IS HOW JESUS THE MESSIAH WAS BORN.

HIS MOTHER, MARY, WAS ENGAGED TO BE MARRIED TO JOSEPH. BUT BEFORE THE MARRIAGE TOOK PLACE, WHILE SHE WAS STILL A VIRGIN, SHE BECAME PREGNANT THROUGH THE POWER OF THE HOLY SPIRIT.

JOSEPH, TO WHOM SHE WAS ENGAGED, WAS A RIGHTEOUS MAN AND DID NOT WANT TO DISGRACE HER PUBLICLY, SO HE DECIDED TO BREAK THE ENGAGEMENT QUIETLY.

AS HE CONSIDERED THIS, AN ANGEL OF THE LORD APPEARED TO HIM IN A DREAM. "JOSEPH, SON OF DAVID," THE ANGEL SAID, "DO NOT BE AFRAID TO TAKE MARY AS YOUR WIFE. FOR THE CHILD WITHIN HER WAS CONCEIVED BY THE HOLY SPIRIT. AND SHE WILL HAVE A SON, AND YOU ARE TO NAME HIM JESUS, FOR HE WILL SAVE HIS PEOPLE FROM THEIR SINS." ALL OF THIS OCCURRED TO FULFILL THE LORD'S MESSAGE THROUGH HIS PROPHET: "LOOK! THE VIRGIN WILL CONCEIVE A CHILD! SHE WILL GIVE BIRTH TO A SON, AND THEY WILL CALL HIM IMMANUEL, WHICH MEANS 'GOD IS WITH US.'" WHEN JOSEPH WOKE UP, HE DID AS THE ANGEL OF THE LORD COMMANDED AND TOOK MARY AS HIS WIFE. BUT HE DID NOT HAVE SEXUAL RELATIONS WITH HER UNTIL HER SON WAS BORN. AND JOSEPH NAMED HIM JESUS.

Emmanuel or Immanuel

Why two spellings for the same word? Which is correct? Both! It's all about transliteration. If I leave you there, you may respond like me and think, "that's clear as mud." Word study is not my expertise, but let me try. The Old Testament Scriptures were written in Hebrew, and the New Testament in Greek. Throw in the process of transliteration and we have two spellings. Depending on the Bible translation you use, you may see this word one or both ways.

In the opening of her book, *Emmanuel, An Invitation to Prepare Him Room at Christmas and Always*, Ruth Chou Simons explains further saying, "Immanuel is the transliteration of the Old Testament Hebrew term *Immanu* ("with us") and *El* ("God"). Emmanuel is the transliteration of the New Testament Greek name Emmanuel, which means, "God with us."

In verse 20 we read these words, "As he considered this." Joseph had taken everything into consideration and decided to quietly break His engagement to Mary. However, he didn't leap forward in haste. What can we learn from this?

By these words, we can conclude that there was a period of time where Joseph paused before acting. This time allowed God to speak and guide Joseph in his next steps. Steps that would look far different if he forged forward without direction from the Lord. What can we learn from this as we strive to live counterculturally for Jesus?





LOOKING BEYOND THE STABLE

Read the following verses paying attention to the obedient faith of Joseph and Mary on display for us to learn from today. Use the remaining space to pen a prayer asking the Lord to guide you in all of your steps as you seek to faithfully follow His lead.

Eight days later, when the baby was circumcised, he was named Jesus, the name given him by the angel even before he was conceived. Then it was time for their purification offering, as required by the law of Moses after the birth of a child; so his parents took him to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord. The law of the Lord says, "If a woman's first child is a boy, he must be dedicated to the Lord." So they offered the sacrifice required in the law of the Lord—"either a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons." Luke 2:21- 24 NLT

That day the Spirit led him to the Temple. So when Mary and Joseph came to present the baby Jesus to the Lord as the law required... Luke 2:27 NLT

When Jesus' parents had fulfilled all the requirements of the law of the Lord, they returned home to Nazareth in Galilee. Luke 2:39NLT

Do you see what see?

What in the world would Joseph do? Such a kind and gentle man, engaged to be married, and then, he discovers that his bride-to-be is with child. No one would fault him for calling off the engagement. In fact, during that time, it was common practice to publicly stone a woman caught in the act of adultery and this is exactly what the case appeared to be. How else could Mary be with child? Joseph and Mary had not laid together, not even once. But rather than disgrace Mary publicly, he decided to quietly call off the engagement and we begin to see the character of Joseph unfold.

I see grace.

He is called "a righteous man" in Matthew 1:19 and his actions certainly confirm this. One source states that the word righteous is used in the scriptures to "describe true believers in God." Joseph's grace-filled response to Mary is certainly evidence of a true believer. His desire to protect and shelter Mary from harm reminds me of Jesus who graciously saved us by taking the punishment for our sins.

I see love.

While Joseph considers his next steps, He experiences a divine intervention. A dream, a message from an angel of the Lord brings clarity to his situation. The angel tells Joseph to put aside his fear and take Mary as his wife. "She will have a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins," the angel proclaims. "Look! The virgin will conceive a child! She will give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel, which means 'God with us.'" (Matthew 1:23) Can you picture Joseph, wide eyes, disheveled hair, but perhaps, breathing easier when he woke up with these cherished words in his heart?

Do you see what t see?

I see trust.

Trust that carries Joseph and his bride all the way to Bethlehem in the last weeks of pregnancy, where no room would be found.

I see obedience.

As he helps his wife wrap their newborn child in swaddling cloths, I see the tender heart of a father, taking God's son into his arms, surveying every little detail as he looks at his son...God's son. Immanuel, God with us.

I see deep faith.



Joseph was committed to Mary. It's hard not to see his love for her. Even before their marriage, when He learned Mary was pregnant, Joseph was loving and kind. ~ Jodie Barrett, Jingle & Joy, Praying Beneath the Tree, Day

The scriptures tell us he didn't disgrace her or leave her. But it did take God's intervention. In the margins of my Bible I have the word "pause" by Matthew 1:20:

"As he considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream. "Joseph, son of David," the angel said, "do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife. For the child within her was conceived by the Holy Spirit." Matthew 1:20 NLT

Often our first responses will come from emotions that stir inside of us. We call these "knee-jerk" reactions because they are like a reflex. They happen without thought. Rather than reacting recklessly, a purposed and holy pause allows God's Spirit to guide us as we invite the Lord to help us navigate our steps during emotionally trying times.

Jus massinges are stronger with God's intervention and guidance.

Even the most challenging times can lead to great blessings when we allow God to take control.

Read Matthew 1:18-25 again. Reflect & spend time in prayer as you learn from Joseph.

- Pray for your own marriage and/or the marriages that touch your life every week.
- If you have young children, pray for their future marriage. Give thanks for those that have encouraged you in your marriage.
- Consider any relationships that are broken in your sphere of influence and pray for healing and restoration.


